BLOOD TESTS

 Present in 1/3 of patients with active IBD Due to inflammation, malabsorption, bleeding Also consider colorectal cancer Inflammation may obscure low ferritin (rises in acute phase) Consider other measures of iron status or treating at higher ferritin level 	 Impaired due to low bowel transit time, malabsorption, active disease Iron B12 Vitamin D Calcium Vitamin K Folic acid 	 Dehydration due to diarrhoea or ileostomy Risk of acute kidney injury in severe flares

 IBS-type symptoms in half of IBD patients in remission Low-FODMAP diet may help Dietitian input essential due to increased risk of malnutrition Increased risk of colorectal cancer Cancer surveillance frequency determined by IBD team 	 Effectiveness of oral contraception may be reduced Fertility rates for women with IBD in remission, without prior surgery, are not reduced Active IBD in pregnancy: increased risk of preterm birth, small for gestational age and foetal loss Pre-conception planning to optimise medication 	 Increased risk of infections requiring admission May be due to disease or treatment Live vaccines contraindicated if patient immunosuppressed Live vaccines include BCG, MMR, nasal flu, oral polio, rotavirus, varicella zoster and yellow fever
